





Year 7 Assessments



- Most subject will carry out departmental baseline assessments
- These feed into curriculum development, not used as a judgement
- At the end of discrete sections or topics, subjects will carry out formal in
 class assessments
- The regularity of assessments will depend on the volume of lessons in each subject eg students will have more Maths assessments lessons in each subject eg students have more regular Maths lessons in each will have expected with the subject effected in the subject effect in the s
- These feed into Student Reports which are sent out twice a year in Year 7, 8
 and 9
